- Cutting new keys and duplicate existing ones using key-cutting machines.
- Rekeying locks to ensure security and restrict unauthorised access.
- Installing and repairing security systems, including electronic locks and keyless entry systems.
- Maintaining accurate records of services rendered, including client information and work performed.
- Staying updated with the latest industry trends, technologies, and security protocols.
- Providing excellent customer service, addressing client concerns and ensuring their satisfaction.

Experience & Skills Required

Among the useful skills to highlight to your employer when applying for a Locksmith role include:

- Must have a natural ability and interest in understanding the mechanics of locks and keys.
- Excellent hand-eye coordination and fine motor skills are essential for manipulating lock mechanisms and working with small tools.
- Locksmiths often encounter complex lock systems and challenging situations that require analytical thinking and problem-solving abilities.
- Precision and meticulousness are crucial when working with delicate lock components and ensuring the accuracy of key duplications or repairs.
- Trainee locksmiths should possess effective communication skills to interact with clients, understand their needs, and provide clear explanations about lock-related issues.
- Familiarity with distinct types of locks, key cutting machines, and locksmith tools is important for a trainee to gain hands-on experience and carry out locksmithing tasks.
- The role of a locksmith can involve physical work such as installing or repairing locks, carrying equipment, and manoeuvring in confined spaces, so a reasonable level of fitness is beneficial.
- Locksmithing often requires time-consuming efforts, especially when dealing with complex lockouts or security systems. Being patient and persistent in finding solutions is crucial.
- Locksmiths often have access to sensitive areas and information, so integrity, confidentiality, and trustworthiness are essential traits.
- Staying updated with the latest advancements in lock technology, security systems, and industry practices is important for a trainee locksmith to grow professionally.
